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Shadow and Light: Patrick Marold

August 11, 2024 - January 5, 2025



Created specifically for Denver Botanic Gardens by Patrick Marold, *Shadow and Light* is an immersive sculptural installation, designed to reflect light in different ways as it shifts in the gallery throughout the day and season, creating a new experience every visit. The exhibition, in the Bonfils-Stanton Gallery at the Gardens' York Street location, is on view August 11, 2024 – January 5, 2025 and is included with general admission.

The large, site-specific sculpture was built to highlight the unique elliptical shape of the Bonfils-Stanton Gallery and is made of several hundred copper-plated steel ribbons suspended from the ceiling, each welded to a central spine. The dark exterior and reflective copper interior of the metal bands generate shadows and patterns.

Marold has experience working in diverse settings at multiple scales. His piece *Shadow Line* was exhibited at Denver Botanic Gardens, as part of the 2013 outdoor exhibition, *Catalyst: Colorado Sculpture*. This work relied on sunlight to cast shadows from a series of vertical steel elements during the solar equinoxes, momentarily drawing a continuous line across the land at midday. His new work, *Shadow and Light*, is an extension of this investigation into the relationship between light and different environments.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Based in Colorado, Patrick Marold's works are deeply tied to landscape and natural cycles. Marold has been the recipient of numerous awards and recognitions, and his works have been shown in exhibitions nationally and internationally. He has been selected for public art projects throughout the United States, including the *Windmill Project* in Vail, Colorado, a temporary landscape installation which seeded a local valley with a mass of light-generating turbines, and *Shadow Array*, a permanent seven-acre installation at Denver International Airport.
