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# Language Without Words: Works by Ash Eliza Williams

December 22, 2024 - May 4, 2025





Ash Eliza Williams' work re-considers the natural world through the eyes of its non-human inhabitants such as rocks, fish, birds and trees. *Language Without Words: Works by Ash Eliza Williams* features 39 works, most new from the *Communication Attempts* series, in which paintings are paired with small sculptures. The exhibition invites viewers to explore how living things communicate and understand one another and is on view December 22, 2024 – May 4, 2025. It is included with Gardens' admission.

The Communication Attempts series is inspired in part by natural history museum displays. Williams is interested in how nature and objects are organized and categorized, and how they might speak to each other when placed in proximity. Williams begins their work with loose conceptual sketches, then renders the sketches in painting and sculpture. They work primarily in oil paint, but also use various materials including gouache paint, acrylic paint, clay, wire and wool.

One piece, *Alphabet of Stones (Lithic Language)*, references the history of biodiversity and the historical information encoded in rock strata and will have a hands-on component.

Williams' work is rooted in scientific study and keen observation of the natural world and they often work with scientists, including at the Museum of Comparative Zoology in Boston, and McDonald Observatory in West Texas.

#### **ABOUT THE ARTIST**

Ash Eliza Williams is currently based in Massachusetts, but previously lived in Denver and is a former RedLine Contemporary Art Center Artist in Residence. Williams has exhibited nationally, including at the

New York Hall of Science; Smith College Museum of Art, Massachusetts; University of Massachusetts Amherst Architecture and Design Gallery; Edward J and Helen Jane Morrison Gallery, University of Minnesota; Museum of Contemporary Art, Denver; the University of Denver; Rocky Mountain College of Art and Design; the University of Colorado Art Museum and the National Center for Atmospheric Research in Boulder. They are represented by K Contemporary in Denver.
